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Planning Priorities of the School

Priority Area #1 - ACADEMIC

Literacy: Increase the number of students demonstrating grade level expectations in the areas of reading, communication and writing.

Numeracy: Increase number of students demonstrating proficiency in the recall of basic facts specific to their grade level.

Accomplishments

Literacy: Balanced Literacy model used to ensure students' learning, writing goals specific to each grade level, promoted Home Reading program using high interest books, Buddy Reading program between grades, Grade 1 and 2 Literacy Intervention, Grade 1 Reading Recovery, Grade 3 Reciprocal Reading comprehension strategies, Gr. 4 Fast ForWord program

<u>Literacy:</u> 80% of Gr. 1-4 students are reading at or above grade level

Numeracy: Specific focus on grade level strategies for students to achieve 90% mastery in recall of basic facts—addition to 5 (Gr. 1), addition to 10 (Gr. 2), subtraction and related addition to 18 (Gr. 3), multiplication to 5 (Gr. 4), purchased additional math materials to support learning, mental math strategies taught in each class, Response to Intervention program in Grades 2-4 with a focus on Place Value, teacher team participated in PD by Dr. Cathy Krpan on Developing Student Thinking and Problem Solving through Communication. **Numeracy Proficiency:** Scores of 90% or above: Gr. 1 Addition to 5 (96% of students), Gr. 2 Addition to 10

<u>Numeracy Proficiency:</u> Scores of 90% or above: Gr. 1 Addition to 5 (96% of students), Gr. 2 Addition to 10 (80% of students), Gr. 3 Addition and Subtraction to 18 (58% of students), Gr. 4 Multiplication/Division to 5 (91% / 74% of students),

Priority Area #2 - EDUCATION FOR SUSTAINABLE FUTURES Accomplishments

Human Health and Well Being: Terry Fox Run raised \$662 for cancer research; strong participation in Intramural programs of Floorball and Intro to Sports Club; Nutrition Month in October promoted eating healthy lunches and family participation through a Bingo game promoting *Eat Right Stay Fit at Home*; participation in the running club for the May Physio-Fit Run; Active and Safe Routes to School implementation of "I Walk to School Days," **Environment:** Eco-Kids club promoted a focus during Earth Week, Gr. 2 Butterfly release at the school and Heritage Centre. Full implementation of composting and recycling programs.

NES / Community: New Student lunch, promoted activities to increase student awareness and acceptance of diversity at NES, continued with Restitution program, Conscious Discipline taught to K and Gr. 1s.

World / Social Justice: NES donated 1824 pounds of food to Niverville Helping Hands during the Drive Away Hunger campaign. The Christmas basket fundraiser raised \$3828: \$2010 was given to class chosen World Vision projects and \$1818 was given to the NES Parent Council projects. NES participated in the Red Cross Day of Pink.

Student Voice

- This year the Grades 3 and 4 students responded to a survey about their recesses. A Recess Leadership team was formed that met and worked through some of the issues raised.
