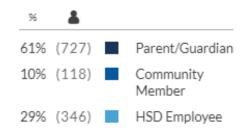

4. Class Sizes

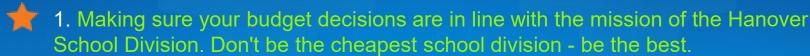
Keep classes small. Large class sizes impact student learning and student and teacher wellness.

1. Priority should be enough teachers and EAs.

Class sizes need to be kept small enough for effective learning and EAs are critical in assisting with the students that can be a distraction.

My students need me in the class learning with them, not sitting in PD that serves no purpose at this stage of my career



3. Classroom Size

When classes grow too large both the top percentile and bottom percentile are lost. The top are not pushed and the bottom are in the hall.



4. Hire more teachers and decrease class sizes (across all grades).

The 1-to-1 ratio for learning is ideal. Although not achievable in public schools, we can get closer to that ratio by opening teaching positions.



5. Keep EAs in Schools

EAs jobs are so important to support students and teachers. It ensures that students get the support they need.

1. Smaller Class Sizes

Classes with fewer students provides more opportunity for teachers to work 1 on 1 with students. Students can have more time with their teachers.



2. Student class sizes, without the cap on numbers, are rising steadily and teachers would like to see numbers reduced.

There are many needs (behavioural and academic) in schools today, and the rising numbers of students per class are creating huge challenges.



3. Increased Staffing

Increasing amount of students coming to school with extra social emotional, mental health and behavioural needs.



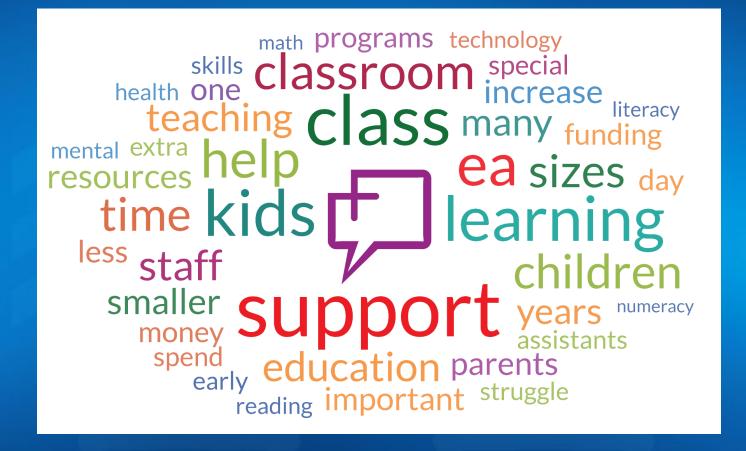
4. Smaller Classes

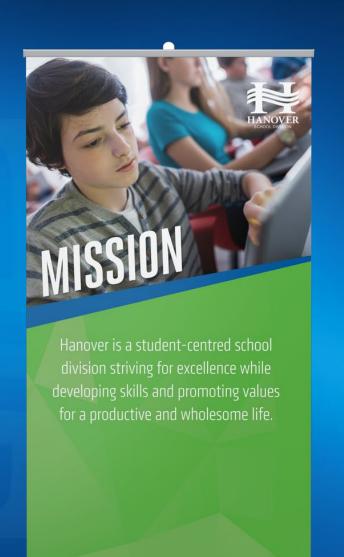

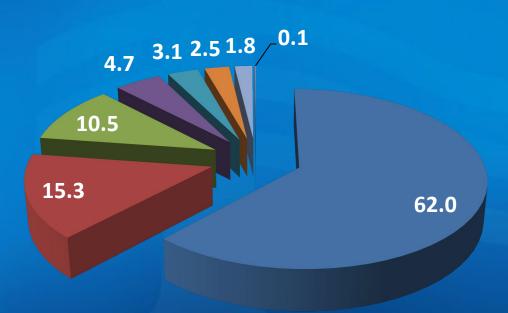

MANITOBA GOVERNMENT INCREASES EDUCATION FUNDING

Province Improves Transparency, Releasing School Division Out-of-Province Travel Expenses

The Manitoba government will increase funding for public schools by more than \$6.6 million for the 2020-21 school year to a record total of \$1.33 billion, Education Minister Kelvin Goertzen announced today.

Manitoba has the third-highest spending per student in Canada at \$14,733, after Saskatchewan and New Brunswick

"This investment in our public schools demonstrates our government's commitment to students' success," said Goertzen. "This funding is the most ever committed to public schools in Manitoba's history. Since 2016, funding to elementary and secondary education has grown by nearly \$33 million."

The funding comes in addition to the province's guarantee to build 20 new schools during the next decade. Two new schools in Winkler and Niverville have been completed and are in use by students. Three new elementary schools in Brandon and Winnipeg are under construction and will open later this year. An additional two new schools in Waverley West are being designed and are scheduled to begin construction before the end of this year, the minister said. In addition, school expansions are happening across the province with openings this week in Neepawa and La Salle.

The cost of these 20 new schools is approximately \$500 million, Goertzen said.
